2023/13240 CONDITION OF STOCK – REPORT BY THE HEAD AGISTER RESUME

Prepared by the Head Agister and read by the Clerk

Over-all the condition of stock is holding up fairly well, despite the continuing wet weather we are experiencing at the moment.

However, there are quite a number of mares with foals still on them, and i have noticed that some of these are losing condition and will need to come off the forest shortly. I can see we will be busy in the New Year.

We have also started marking cattle for next year, during the TB test window for commoners' cattle, and there have been at least one holding where the Agisters would not mark some of the cattle due to the poor condition of a few individual animals, but this is not a widespread problem.

We also know of a few yearling colts out there, that will of course soon be two year olds, and these will also have to be removed, which will inevitably fall to the Agisters to catch.

Finally, we plan to implement the change in Agister areas to begin from the 1st of January, to coincide with the start of the new marking fee year.

2023/13241 WELFARE TOUR OF THE FOREST – FRIDAY 8TH DECEMBER DISCHARGE 2023 – Report prepared by Mr Deakin and read by the Clerk

The welfare tour was held on December 8th, with several Verderers in attendance.

The day was fortunately sunny and dry, following one of those exceptionally wet days. A reasonable number of animals were seen, but not as many as on some tours, probably because some were reluctant to come out after sheltering the previous day. All animals seen were in good or very good condition, including some mares still carrying foals.

Attendance was down a little from our average numbers, but there were some new faces, notably four from APHA, and the NFNPA chairman. It was a good opportunity to educate the APHA staff who deal with our TB plan, and to discuss future funding with David Bence who chairs the future funding group. The chats along the way are probably more important than actually seeing animals. All feedback was good and as usual reinforced the value of the tours.

DISCHARGE

The DS's recollection of the meeting differs from the agreed minutes (November Minute No. 2023/13211 refers) in that he thought 2 years had been agreed.

The DS advised that in light of the Court only agreeing 1 year, he would be bringing the item back again next year to request a further year.

The DS advised that following the completion of the Campsite Review, a longer-term strategy will be brought to the Court, which will hopefully mean that further extensions will not be required.

2023/13246 HEALTH & SAFETY VS ENVIRONMENTAL LEGISLATION

DISCHARGE

In the December Court under Campsites, Minute No. 13200, Mr Grugeon suggested that Health and Safety Legislation trumps Environmental Legislation. He quoted from The Queen on the application of 'The Heath & Hampstead Society vs The Mayor and Commonalty and Citizens of the City of London (acting by The Hampstead Heath, Highgate Wood and Queen's Park Management Committee ((and the projects sub committee)). However, when Mr Gammon read the judgement, his view differed. He believes the judgement concludes there are no hard and fast rules where there is conflicting legislation. Each case must be considered on the facts and its own merits. The Judge in the Hampstead Heath case felt that the decision would need to satisfy public safety first whilst causing the least possible damage to the environment.

2023/13247 ASHURST HOSPITAL

RESUME February

A letter has been received from the NHS's solicitor disagreeing with the Court's views that the common rights on the land were not extinguished and they cited a High Court ruling from 1995 as their evidence. The Court disagrees. After some discussion it was agreed the advice of the Court's solicitor should be sought to decide on a way forward. The OV will draft a letter seeking that advice. The Clerk will provide such supporting papers as she can identify. The Court asked to see the draft before it is sent.

All agreed that the issue of consents for large events does need wider discussion.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS INVOLVING FORESTRY ENGLAND

2023/13260 BEAULIEU ROAD STATION - NETWORK RAIL'S REQUEST TO DISCHARGE CREATE A COMPOUND FOR EQUIPMENT AND MATERIALS

STORAGE

Network Rail is proposing to create a compound on a piece of land which has been open to Forest stock for many years. Re-enclosing it was discussed. On the one hand, the land will be required for railway purposes and therefore appears to satisfy the reversion clause in the Railway Act. On the other hand, the land may now be regarded as subject to prescriptive rights for the commoners' animals to graze. After careful consideration the Court agreed not to object and NWR's proposal was agreed. A request will, however be made, that the area be reopened to stock if at a future point it is no longer required for railway purposes.

2023/13261 FUTURE PLANS FOR ICE CREAM CONCESSIONS

DISCHARGE

The DS outlined FE's proposals for extending the concessions to provide a more modern and high quality offering to include the sale of tea, coffee and cakes, as well as Ice Cream. Conditions will be placed on the concessionaires which will include keeping areas around their units free of litter by minimising packaging and ensuring their customers do not feed or interact with the commoners' animals.

In time further proposals will be brought forward in respect of 5 sites and these will include refurbishment/reconstruction of some toilet blocks.

2023/13262 CULVERTS UNDER THE HILLTOP TO IPERS BRIDGE ROAD

DISCHARGE

Mr Readhead thanked FE for keeping the culverts under this road clear in order that the road doesn't flood. He said it has been a major success.

2023/13263 ROADSIDE VEGETATION

DISCHARGE

Mr Readhead also thanked FE for the work it has done in keeping verges in his area clear and cutting back gorse which has resulted in some excellent regeneration. Young gorse is a wonderful food for the ponies.

2023/13264 GORSE

DISCHARGE

On Blackfield Common, the gorse has reached a height of 10-12ft in some places and it is felt to be a hazard to walkers. When stock runs about, people can hear the animals but not see them. Mr Readhead asked whether the gorse height could be reduced as a lot of people walk on Blackfield Common and he is concerned there could be an accident.

It was also pointed out that very tall gorse causes problems for stock management. When driving stock on horseback, the ponies get into the gorse where riders may not be able to follow. Blackfield Drift was always a good drift for young commoners riding for the first time, but unfortunately because of the gorse, that is no longer the case.

The issue is under discussion at the Open Forest Advisory Committee (OFAC).

2023/13265 FALLEN TIMBER

DISCHARGE

Mr Readhead expressed concern at the quantity of fallen timber open the Forest, and he cited the road at Pennerley as a good example. He described the situation as 'chaotic'. In the past, fallen timber used to be cleared up, preventing animals getting trapped and avoiding loss of grazing. Mr Stride agreed and said the amount left now far exceeds what is needed. The Court generally felt the balance has tipped too far in favour of conservation and the amount of wood left on the ground has become a nightmare for stock management. Mr Chatters disagreed. It is an ongoing issue which is difficult to resolve because of such strong opposing views.

2023/13266 RESEEDED AREAS

DISCHARGE

The reseeded areas have always been of significant benefit to the animals by providing grass for the ponies in particular. However, it has become drastically reduced due to the amount of heather, gorse and other course herbage which is taking over. In some places, and Horseshoe Bottom was mentioned, grass is now virtually non-existent. Again, there are strong opposing views. It is agreed future landscape schemes must take this issue into account.

2023/13267 BRAMBLES AT ABBOTSWELL CORNER

DISCHARGE

Miss Sevier thanked FE for the bramble clearance work which has been undertaken at Abbotswell Corner.

2023/13268 CRICKET

DISCHARGE

Mr Grugeon advised the Court that an event is being planned for the first weekend in July to celebrate Lyndhurst Cricket Club's 150th Anniversary. The event will be held on Bolton's Bench and details will be provided in due course.

2023/13269 NEW FOREST LAND AGENT'S RETIREMENT

DISCHARGE

Mr Grugeon is retiring at the end of March. The recruitment process to select his successor will commence shortly.

2023/13274 DRIFTS – WASHUP MEETING/REVIEW – report prepared by Mr DISCHARGE Deakin and read by the Clerk

The annual drift review is part of a continuous improvement process, with lessons learnt captured to be taken forward into the following year. Identified follow up actions are recorded and stewarded through the Staff Committee minutes. Attendees are Staff Committee Verderers, Agisters, and a FE representative, there on behalf of all rangers.

32 Drifts were scheduled, with 27 being completed. 2 were cancelled due to local strangles, 2 because of Electricity pylon work, 1 because it was felt not to be needed.

Numbers of ponies driven in varied considerably across the programme, and in some cases consideration will be given to changing drift tactics, or direction. Those decisions will be left to the discretion of the local Agister and will not be stewarded.

It was noted that two drifts were very successful after a new direction was taken.

Increased use of the mobile (temporary) pound and chute facilities in our attempts to change things around a little, uncovered some safety concerns. Minor modifications have been identified, and will be actioned prior to the 2024 season.

High gorse in many areas of the Forest made drifting difficult, due to an inability to see and at times keep up with the driven ponies. Deadwood in places generally, and vegetation at the run in to pounds caused problems. These will be reported to the Forest Management team and to OFAC to be considered for action.

5 commoners were identified as having gone above and beyond in their contributions to the drift execution. Thank you letters have been written. It was also agreed that the FE and NPA Rangers made a great contribution. Thanks to be given through the Court.

In contrast, it was noted that the drifts in the Northern portion of the Forest were tacking in Commoner riders and help in general. This has been mentioned at NFCDA meetings, but no effective solution identified.

Communications to the Rangers could be improved if radios could be tuned to a common channel. This will be investigated.

Use of sticks as an arm extension was mentioned at the November Court.

With respect to Mr Deakin's comment about the lack of help in the north of the Forest, it was pointed out that few drifts in the north are held at weekends when more commoners could be available. This will be addressed for 2025 as next year's drift list has already been drawn up.

2023/13275 NEW FOREST SHOW 2024

DISCHARGE

It was agreed the Verderers will once again have a stand at the New Forest Show in 2024. A budget of up to £3,500 to spend on the display was approved.

The staff and particularly Miss Bayley were thanked for their hard work in creating an excellent display.

A discussion took place on whether an allocation of tickets could be provided for Verderers who attend the Show specifically to help on the stand. The Clerk explained that apart from 9 tickets which are provided FOC by the Show Society, any others must be paid for and providing tickets for everyone would obviously result in significant additional expenditure. The OV suggested that if a Verderer would not usually attend the Show, and goes along only to assist on the stand, it is reasonable that a free ticked be provided. After further discussion, it was agreed that appointed Verderers who assist should claim the cost of their ticket from their appointing organisation but elected Verderers who only attend to assist on the stand, may request a ticket.

REPORTS FROM EXTERNAL COMMITTEES & WORKING GROUPS

2023/13276 LEADERSHIP GROUP

DISCHARGE

The OV sits on this group, which is attended by senior representatives of statutory and public bodies. The group discusses matters such as agri-environment schemes. The OV suggested inviting members of the group to an Open Court, followed by a trip out into the Forest with two Verderers, before returning to the Kings House for lunch and further discussion.

2023/13277 LOCAL NATURE RECOVERY STRATEGY

DISCHARGE

Mr Chatters said Defra has appointed Hampshire County Council as the Responsible Authority for the Hampshire area in respect of the strategy.

Each Local Nature Recovery Strategy will be evidence-based, locally led and collaborative, to create a network of shared plans that public, private, and voluntary sectors can all help to deliver. Natural England will lead the Government's involvement and will work alongside each of the Responsible Authorities to help shape the strategy and ensure overall consistency. The preparation of each LNRS will also be supported by the Environment Agency and the Forestry Commission.

A meeting is due to be held and the Court has been asked to send a representative. Mr Manley said he would like to attend as Defra's Appointed Verderer. Dr Ferris also expressed an interest in attending. The OV will take this forward.
